Dear Friends at St Paul's

Since Low Sunday, 2019, I have had the privilege of being invited to preside at the St Paul's Eucharist & preach a number of times

After each service various people have expressed appreciation for *my* endeavours.

However, following today's service, June 16th 2019, I found myself reflecting with heartfelt thanks for those many parishioners whose endeavours make it possible for us to have wonderful worship together, and upon whom, when I am the priest, my contribution is founded.

I want to acknowledge and thank those *many, many* folk, who

1. Provide a cleaned church, and set it up for worship and clear up afterwards. There is often liturgical art & flowers. [by Kim, Debbie & perhaps others]. The bread & wine for communion are always in place. The PA and lapel mike ready to go. The Church is always open when I arrive; someone lights and extinguishes the candles; open & shuts windows; collects the offering after the service.
2. All who welcome us into the church as sides persons, who read, assist with communion, arrange the offertory procession, make sure the pew sheet is ready to go [Gabby] and include any request I make. I simply know these actions will happen. Those [Toni, Liz, Johanna] who quietly honouring the young folk, take them out of the service and sacrifice their place in worship.
3. The PAs who week by week make sure the liturgy functions and flows, and I can easily step into the Priest's role. I find it really comfortable & supportive working with Peter, Gabby & Christabel. For me, they have a wonderful sense of the worship moment
4. Provide the music: [Janice, Cherie & choir] who always seem to capture the spiritual intention I am hoping for and work so easily with my requests, sometimes made just before the service as in today's singing in rounds where we sang in 3 parts, and sang one song of the Trinity.
5. Whoever it is that makes sure all the above happen.

Whilst we have had our trials:

- [when the Archbishop asked Rev Michael Jessup to withdraw it felt to me like we were witnessing a divorce;
- when Rev Stuart Fenner decided to leave the parish & he and Helena spoke, it felt to me like a death in the family]



- and we have grieved over the death of a number of parishioners and watched some loved friends withdraw from our community because of age and health.]

Yet, in all the services I have presided over I have found our being together & worship both encouraging and uplifting, whilst at the same time acknowledging the pain. Once again today a large number of people came to the sanctuary steps to receive the final blessing and a large number came to support them. For me as priest that is quite telling & poignant.

INTRODUCTION

The kids at St Paul's have just realised that there aren't as many kids coming as there used to be, so we've decided to make a small report for the big AGM meeting that's coming up soon. We all gave in an ideas page and so my mum told me to write this report.

These are the titles you will read in this report: What we did this year; Our Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Threats; What we will do next year.

WHAT WE DID THIS YEAR

This year:

- We had a families picnic at Kings Park
- We decorated the table for Morning Tea with flowers from the garden
- We held a tug of war on Fathers' Day
- We learnt about the Lord's Prayer
- We made a scrapbook about us to share with the IGWR children in Nepal
- We started sometimes splitting the group into older and younger kids, e.g. the older kids started the NUA film series, which is made by Scripture Union
- We made a cardboard nativity scene during advent
- We went to the beach on Christmas morning
- We went on a sensory journey through Lent: water, sand, noise and the garden
- We hosted an all age picnic at Manning Park
- We built a duplo church at the start of the inter regnum
- We started exploring 1 Corinthians 13, we had a quiz to test how patient we are
- We enjoyed a families lunch at Chris, Robin and Bethan's house with their cute puppies
- We made a prayer labyrinth out of candles for Pentecost

OUR STRENGTHS, WEAKNESSES, OPPORTUNITIES AND THREATS

We think we are **strong** because:

- We have a group of families who attend regularly
- The weekly activities are somewhat organised
- It is a great way of making new friends out of school
- We all like morning tea
- We have opportunities to serve in church, e.g. helping on the altar, carrying the cross, singing in the choir
- We can have our say in kids council
- We asked for more active games and activities through kids council and our request was listened to



- We like playing in the garden

We think we are **weak** because:

- The activities that are happening right now are not always planned so they are very last minute
- There are only a few of us that are coming and there are not many kids of similar age, which can make it boring
- Morning tea is the same most weeks
- The activities are not always aimed at the right age group so they can be boring
- Activities that are more challenging feel like work
- Activities are not planned far enough ahead

We are worried about these **threats**:

- We always miss the middle of the service so we don't learn about that part of church first hand
- The current group is getting older
- No new regular families have joined recently
- We are a very stable group so we may accidentally be not very welcoming
- Some people may want to keep everything the same
- There aren't many all age activities at our church

We saw lots of **opportunities** to make St Paul's better. We want to come to St Paul's to feel part of the community and have fun:

- Some of us would like to read in church
- We would like to learn more modern worship songs
- We would like to do more drama activities up in the hall, e.g. create skits on the theme of "love is kind"
- We would like to host a from your own culture food festival
- We would like to have more feasts
- We would like to do Messy Church activities, e.g. painting, mural paintings
- We would like to invite other adults to help us with activities up in the hall sometimes
- We would like to host morning tea on Mothers and Fathers Days

We want to have fun with our friends from St Paul's after church:

- We would like more after church socials for kids and for everybody, e.g. sports day, beach day, bowling, roller disco, west coast fever match, camping, games nights, picnics

We want St Paul's to grow:

- We would like to invite our friends to socials (or church)
- We could make posters to promote St Paul's at our schools or in the community
- The older kids could help with St Paul's social media
- We would like St Paul's to attempt a world record



We want St Paul's to speak out on issues that are important to us:

- We would like to raise money for St Paul's charities and for global issues, e.g. orangutans
- We would like to champion climate and sustainability issues at St Paul's, e.g. we could attend a climate strike, we could provide church with metal straws, promote recycling at church

WHAT WE WILL DO NEXT YEAR

Next year we are already planning:

- To continue with the NUA film series
- To continue studying 1 Corinthians 13 and thinking about how we can apply it to our own lives and at St Paul's
- To continue serving the church as cross bearers, altar servers, readers and singers
- To lead a community service in July, including giving a video sermon about what we would like church to look like in the future
- To host an all ages games night in July
- To organise a from your culture food festival in August
- To go stand up paddle boarding in spring
- To go camping for a long weekend in summer

WARDENS' REPORT FOR AGM 2019

2018 - 2019 was a year full of Love and Losses

- Funerals and Thanksgiving services for Beryl Hogan and Shelley Davis in June and Ronny Cockram, our beloved Office Administrator (and so much more) in July.
- Belinda Hopper's beautiful Concert Songs of Love and Loss with Sara MacIver and Ronniet Orlando and Silvia Grevel's The Soul Travels from Dark to Light Loss as a Transformative Process in August and celebration of Michael and Ronny's 50th Wedding Anniversary and Nelson and Thea's 60th Wedding Anniversary were all opportunities to share joys and sorrows.
- Other wonderful creative events and celebrations were the Bastille Day Fundraiser, The October Quiz Night and David Hawks Interview with Tim Winton, more concerts (Allegri Chamber Orchestra in December and the Harp Ensemble Concert in February 2019) and Poetry evenings with Chris Wortham.
- Congregational highlights were Family Picnics, Singing through Advent culminating in the all age choir at Midnight Mass, Christmas drinks at the Rectory and the Meditation groups and Quiet mornings.
- The tradition of Elders Morning Tea started by Kim continued on a monthly basis by Joan Jessup for the past 9 years.

Beginning joyfully with Rev Stuart Fenner as our new priest, the past year has been both positive and problematic for St Paul's. At last year's AGM Christabel chose to continue for another year as Warden to assist Stuart and his new warden John Daniel in the transition to a new era. Sadly events turned out differently, with Stuart's resignation the Sunday before Palm Sunday. The Church Council with Carol Eaton as Secretary and Maureen Lucivero as Treasurer assisted by Peter Smith, Laurel Ellis, Debbie Gwynne and Elizabeth Meredith deserve our grateful thanks as does Rev Michael Jessup for his 9 years of unpaid work as Deacon and assistance in the office when we lost Ronny. We thank Stuart and Helena and their family for what they brought and shared with St Paul's and wish them well in their future plans.

We now are looking for another series of supply priests or a transition locum to help us await the choice and arrival of a new priest. We are extremely grateful to Archdeacon Angela Webb, Rev Howard Eaton and Rev Michael Wood for helping us (looking forward to Rev Ros Fairless too). In recognition of the difficulty in finding supply priests, we are having a monthly Community service. We are grateful to the Liturgical Assistants for beautiful community services so far, and to Robin Coopes-Williams for her enthusiasm to help at the latest service. We encourage other members of the community to take the opportunity to assist in holding the sacred space. The requests for baptisms, confirmation, funerals and memorial services (interestingly not so many weddings) continue. Maureen Lucivero has had a great support role in the office assisting first Mark then Zara who is still with us on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Recently Julie Copson has agreed to fill in when Zara takes leave. Gabby has continued the responsibility of creating the Pew sheets and Zara the newsletter, which are both highly valued.



Cathcart Weatherly has contributed also in many varied ways with posters, events and technological assistance.

Highlights of recent months where our beautiful hall and grounds have been much appreciated are:-

- Regular Zen Buddhist retreat days
- 2 Baptisms with Angela Webb and Michael Wood,
- 5 Funerals – Eric (Rowland) Tchan, Sally Holmes' mother, Pauline O'Hara's mother, Francis Xavier, Victoria Mercer.

Despite surgery for her and Michael, Laurel Ellis has helped to hold the sacred space of Morning and Evening Prayer. Kim Kemp has been worth her weight in gold upholding the seasonal decoration, and with Feonagh Cooke, the background readiness of the church. Simone with his Monday coffee and cake treats has kept morale up when we could have become discouraged, as have John and Maggie Dunnill, Ruth Shelley and Paul with his firelighting on Friday nights. Saturday breakfast continues to be supported, although not as strongly in the winter months. Michael and Joan Jessup have continued the valuable work with Foundation Housing and support for Homeless Health Service referrals. Janice's new choir and Chris Williams' "Conversation for a Faith Community" are other examples of gifts emerging from the gaps and loss which have occurred.

The role of the Wardens involves many and varied calls and includes upkeep and maintenance of our buildings and care for one another, our regular hall users and the wider community. Martin McAllen offered his help in May and came on board to help supervise the font reconstruction connected with the Fire insurance repair. He has done a great job liaising with the workmen and supporting the Wardens. Bob Matthews and Rob Christie also helped with the repair of the Church Front doors.

The support of these and many others, filling the gaps and keeping the show on the road, particularly since Stuart and Helena left, is very much appreciated. It is at times like these that the lovely steady support of the Church Council and parishioners, whether with rostered tasks or simply turning up, has been a great source of encouragement. TREASURER'S REPORT FOR 2018-2019

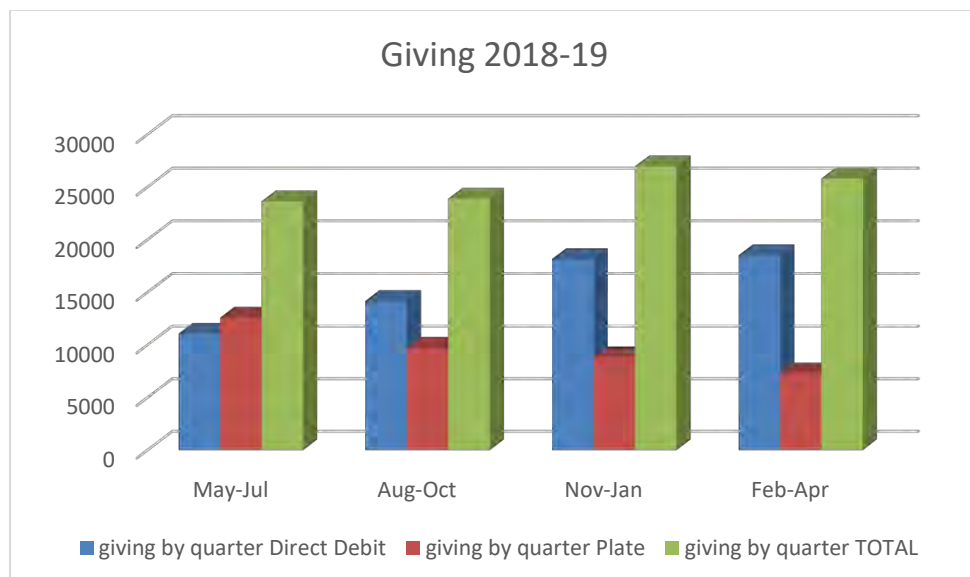
INCOME AND EXPENDITURE

For the 2018/19 year our total operating income was \$160,136, and expenses \$164,471, leaving us with a deficit of \$4,335.

The Hall continues to be well used and is a major source of income for us – income from rent was \$37,361

Giving has been gradually rising over the year, levelling out last quarter, with the percentage given by direct debit increasing from 47% to 72%. This was a direct result of last year's campaign to encourage people to give electronically. If you would like to do this, account details are:

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CHURCH RESTORATION

We also received \$13,005 donated towards the renovation of the rectory, and \$7,750 into the National Trust Account. All donations to the National Trust are Tax Deductible. Account details are:

BSB 306 089, account 4189329, reference: 1928 AND YOUR NAME
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Just after the end of the financial year we received a \$10,000 bequest left to us by Ronny to use on church or hall restoration. This will bring the National Trust account up to just over \$33,000.

Our major capital expense for the year was the Rectory Renovation (we did not use any National Trust funds on this).

LOAN FOR RECTORY

We received a couple of generous donations towards the end of the year, leaving us with only \$5,000 owing. This is being paid off at the rate of \$500/month.

ASSESSMENT ARREARS

The outstanding balance has been reduced to \$7,084 and our budget this year would almost see this debt paid. When that happens the Diocese has agreed to write off another amount of \$13,269 outstanding from 2012.

MORE THAN FACTS AND FIGURES

I have recently filled out an Annual Return for the Diocese, which includes a section for the ACNC (Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission), and for the second year in a row I reported the number of employees as follows:

- 1 full time paid
- 1 part time paid
- 60 part time voluntary

As I said last year, this count of 60 people is probably understated – it is only the people that I know of. I would particularly like to thank some of them here – the St. Paul's Finance Team:

Bob Matthews, outstanding Treasurer for 11 years and now Parish Examiner

Neville Taylor and the fantastic money counting team, who regularly delay their Sunday morning tea to take care of business.

And all those who contribute in many ways towards the running of this Parish, giving of their money, time, skills, and gifts.



When I prepared the financial report for the last Parish Council meeting of the year I noticed some interesting and unusual things about our accounts.

Wedding and flower expenses for the year \$359.

Groups and fellowship – including Elders Morning Tea - \$0

JUST MANNA INCORPORATED – REPORT



BACKGROUND:

Just Manna Inc is a charitable organisation associated with St Paul's Anglican Church, Beaconsfield.

It is a not-for-profit organisation which has been in operation since 2006. Originally, it was set up to serve refugees newly arrived in Australia and has expanded to serve all members of our community in need.

AIM:

Just Manna aims to provide direct relief of poverty, sickness, suffering, distress, disability or helplessness including financial and non-financial assistance to people in Australia.

“Do not run away from people who are in pain or who are broken, but to walk towards them, to touch them.

Just Manna continues to have a strong presence within our community. We work with other agencies to ensure we are not duplicating services, instead focusing on meeting unmet community needs. Much of this work involves being an advocate for our clients as they negotiate complex situations.

Just Manna is pleased to continue working with and receiving referrals from:

- “Ocean View Lodge” –Street to Home Programme
- A Woman's Refuge Centre
- Ruah Community Services
- Homeless Healthcare
- Syrian Refugees
- Alma Street Clinic
- AYLA Inc. – Assisting Your Life to Achieve

- Elinor Harvey Nursing Foundation

HIGHLIGHTS 2018/2019:

The nature of our work is confidential and as such makes it difficult to share detailed information.



The following information is an example only of some of the extensive work of Just Manna:

Syrian Refugees:

Just Manna has established a connection with the Syrian refugee community and has been delighted to provide; floor rugs, beds and bedding, white goods and other household goods as well as food vouchers and financial assistance with utility bills.

In addition, Just Manna provides on-going support for two disabled Syrian children with the provision of continence aids.

Ruah Community Services:

Ruah provide housing for the homeless and mental health services within the community.

Just Manna has been pleased to assist Ruah clients as requested with the provision of household goods such as beds, washing machines and fridges.

With a focus on enabling clients to pursue their interests and be more active, Just Manna has responded to a request for a compact fishing rod to enable a Ruah client to take his fishing rod on public transport.

Another client was delighted to be the recipient of a bicycle which enabled him to be more independent.

Just Manna has also funded the relocation costs of a disabled woman and her family.

Homeless Healthcare:

Homeless Healthcare (HHC) operates from "Ocean View Lodge" as well as from the Ruah office and provides wonderful healthcare support to the homeless. Just Manna provides support in many various ways to the HHC clients. This support includes the provision of "Smart Rider" transport cards and taxi vouchers to enable clients to attend medical and other appointments as required. In addition Just Manna has provided clients with clothing needs as well as with toiletry products

White Goods:

There continues to be a steady request for the provision of washing machines, microwaves and refrigerators as well as other household goods.

Christmas Giving- Gift and Food Vouchers:

Just Manna distributed food and gift vouchers to a value of \$2,500 for Christmas 2018.

In addition, Just Manna provides food vouchers to individuals and families in crisis throughout the year.

Ocean View Lodge:

Rev Michael Jessup has continued to provide a chaplaincy service for those on the "street to home" programme at "Ocean View Lodge" (OVL). Michael not only provides pastoral support to these clients many of who have experienced trauma in their lives but also provides advocacy support as these clients try to navigate complex situations.



No-Cost OP-Shop:

In conjunction with Ocean View Lodge, Just Manna has set up and manages a “No-Cost Op Shop” on their premises. This service provides “welcome packs” for all new residents. These packs include a towel, cutlery, crockery, toiletries as well as pots and pans. Many of these clients have either come to OVL from the “street”, recently released from incarceration or have fled from a domestic violence situation and arrive at OVL with only the clothes they are wearing. In addition to the “welcome pack”, Just Manna provides a large selection of good quality pre-loved clothes as well as new socks and underwear and other items for all OVL residents. As the name suggest, all items are a gift to the clients.

Just Manna also offers clients the opportunity to have a chat over morning tea with homemade goodies.

These informal gatherings often provide an opening for amore in depth pastoral conversation with Michael Jessup.

Educational Support/ Personal Development:

Just Manna has provided computers for those seeking employment and personal development. In addition, a computer has been provided for two primary school aged children to assist them with on-line learning to improve their numeracy and literary skills. In addition, afterschool tutoring is provided 3 afternoons per week and has resulted in an improved confidence and attitude to learning. Support and encouragement provided to these children in regards to school attendance has resulted in a rise from 30% attendance to 95% attendance.

Just Manna has been delighted to respond to numerous requests for assistance in filling school book lists and providing shoes for students. A total of \$800 was spent this year for local students. The support has extended from our local schools students to include supporting women living in sheltered accommodation to ensure their children commenced school with a complete book list.

Just Manna has funded 3 children at the Beaconsfield Primary School to attend their final year school camp. A further 6 children at Beaconsfield Primary School have been funded for swimming lessons whilst others have received funding to attend other extra curriculum activities.

Sport and Recreation Activities:

Just Manna has had the privilege to pay the enrolment fee as well as necessary sporting gear for a n 8 year old boy who has a passion to play football. The discipline associated with attending training and participating in a team event has greatly contributed to this young boy’s development, behaviour and social skills.

Just Manna has also provided funding for a young woman with mental health issues to attend a pottery course to encourage her interaction with others and to gain confidence to leave to confines and security of her home.

Funding has also been provided by Just Manna to local schools for children to attend extra curriculum activities which they would otherwise not be able to attend.



Housing Bonds and Utility Bills:

Just Manna has provided funds to cover the expense of the housing rental bonds for those seeking accommodation. Just Manna is delighted to support AYL A Inc. (Assisting Your Life Achieve) with their new initiative to provide crisis accommodation for the LGBTQI community and women transitioning from correctional facilities. Just Manna has provided financial support for five LGBTQI clients with housing bonds to enable them to move into independent accommodation and live a more independent life.

Advocacy Role:

Just Manna has provided a valuable support by representing clients in negotiations with various agencies; including housing authorities, social security agencies, legal counsel, court appearances and healthcare providers.

Meals:

Approximately 700 nutritious meals have been distributed throughout the year to those in need.

Medical Expenses:

This year Just manna has provided funds to cover some basic health care costs such as essential dental care and ophthalmic as well as covering pharmaceutical costs for those requiring essential medication on the PBS system.

It is a constant delight that Just Manna is in a position to meet the needs of others.

This is however only possible through the generosity of others giving to Just Manna.

St Paul's Beyond Inc. is a not for profit association established by some parishioners of St Paul's for the purposes of providing long term funds to support and encourage outreach by the St. Paul's community and the development of the St. Paul's Precinct.

SPBI was initiated in January of 2011 and has been operating as a Board since then to encourage bequests and the prudent management of resources donated to it. The late Alan Albany, a long-standing member of St Paul's was part of the originating discussions to establish the association and one of the first to leave property to the organisation in his will. Unfortunately Alan's untimely death in 2012 and the terms of his will, mean that Alan's estate is yet to be distributed. This reflection, shared by Gabby Dean recently, is so very appropriate for both our community and for our ministry in Nepal for IGWR-Nepal are making pathways for the children we support and are constantly responding to changing circumstances.

So often we are disturbed by change, and yet change is the way forward and we can either resist or become an integral part of creating tomorrow.

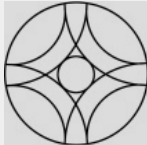
